The Law

Schools are responsible for creating safe environments for students. They must work to prevent bullying and they must respond to it when it happens.

Definition of Bullying

 A student is being bullied when he or she is repeatedly exposed to intentional aggressive actions over time, on the part of one or more students.



Three Factors

- Repeated over time
- Intentional harm doing
- Occurs in a relationship in which there is an imbalance of power

Direct vs. Indirect Bullying

 Direct: Hitting/ kicking/ taunting/ racial slurs/ threatening/ obscene gestures

 Indirect: Getting another person to bully for you/ spreading rumors/ cyberbullying

Bullying Chart

Rough Housing	Real Fighting	Bullying
Usually friends; often repeated (same players)	Usually not friends; typically not repeated	Typically not friends; generally repeated
Balance of power	Power relatively equal	Unequal power
No intent to harm	Intentional harm doing	Intentional power
Affect is friendly; positive, mutual	Affect negative; aggressive, tense, hostile affect	Affect negative; aggressive & differs for victim and aggressor
